Here we are in the middle of the 2020 Olympics, and I can't help but be enamored by the athleticism and discipline of these athletes. They make the sports they are doing look so easy and simple- yet we all know that there are thousands of hours of practice, personal sacrifices, and many disappointments along the way. It's what is going on behind the scenes that makes their performance at the Olympic look so easy. As I think of the excitement of the Olympics, I can't help but remember how Paul utilized the Olympics in Greece as an illustration in one of his letters. The Olympics starting back way back in the B.C. era and were going on in Greece at the time of Paul. When Paul is writing to the Corinthians, he utilizes the Olympics as an example.

"Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. 25. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. 26. Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. 27. No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize.

(1 Corinthians 9:24-27)

As we run the race of faith, we must ask ourselves if we are training our spiritual lives to have the endurance to last the entire race. The journey of faith, just like the journey to the Olympics, is filled with challenges, loss, and self-discipline. While we may see the Olympians in their prime as they compete, we know they faced difficulties and disappointments to get to where they are. In the same way, we may not see the trials that those around us are going through. Yet it is having worked through our "suffering that produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope." (Romans 5:4) Instead of getting discouraged and giving up, we must keep our eyes on the prize- a prize which will not tarnish. The good news is that we do not have to persevere alone. First and foremost, we

have the promise and the presence of the Holy Spirit. God also has placed us in community with one another, where we can bear one another's burdens, encourage one another, and carry the faith for one another when our road gets heavy. I am so thankful to be serving alongside such a congregation that takes community so seriously.

MUSIC NOTES

My Hope Is Built (The Solid Rock) (Hymn # 368, The United Methodist Hymnal)

Edward Mote was raised in London in a financially poor, non-Christian family. After hearing the Gospel as a teenager, Edward accepted Christ. As an adult, he had a career as a carpenter and became a cabinet shop owner, so he was quite an industrious young man. At age 37, Edward Mote wrote the words to "The Solid Rock." Mote had written the first two verses while at home in 1834, and he had those verses in his pocket when he visited a friend whose wife was seriously ill. He sang the verses with his friend, Mr. King, and the song comforted the couple. The last two verses Edward wrote when he returned home, and he carried those back to the couple's home. Since the song was so well received, Edward decided to print copies of the song. One thousand copies, to be exact! The carpenter, Edward Mote, changed careers at age 55, and became a Baptist minister in Sussex, England. Rev. Mote served in Sussex for twenty-one years and continued to write nearly a hundred hymns. What a contribution he made to our Christian hymns from his humble beginnings! He retired in 1873 in poor health, and passed away the following year. I, too, had an early career different from church music service as a social worker. One might be very surprised by the plans that God, Our Father, has for all of us. He will come knocking. What will he ask of you? --Jolynn Stevens---

August 8th:


