
### A Note From The Pastor



# A Message From Frank

For those of you who are not aware, I have exited a long term phase in my life and am adjusting to a new phase. On June 1, 2024, I handed my keys to Demico's leased space to my landlord and walked away. Demico is no longer a company. (1979-2023) I guess you might say I am now unemployed, retired, or as I think about it, I am recovering from being an entrepreneur, a business owner, an electrical engineer, electronic technician, electronic assembler, machinist, janitor, secretary, accountant, bill creator, and bill payer - among other things. The core of Murphy-Harpst is to provide a safe and nurturing residential environment along with treatment, placement in specialized foster care, and community programs that will allow them to thrive.


